



Objectives: To explain that:

- Jesus taught that just as the temple was supposed to be a holy place where blood sacrifices for the forgiveness of sin were made, his body was now God's holy temple and his blood would pay for sin.
- Jesus drove out the money changers from the Court of the Gentiles, where the Gentiles were allowed to come and worship God. By this action, he reminded Israel that his promise was for all nations.

"I Wonder" Questions:

What do you see in this picture? (Jesus holding a whip, turning over tables)

Is there anything you wonder about?

I wonder where this is taking place.

I wonder what Jesus is doing. Let's find out more in our story...

Lesson Summary:

Today, our Bible story takes us to the Temple in Jerusalem. The Temple was the most important place for the Israelite people to worship God. It was supposed to be a holy place where blood sacrifices were offered to forgive sins. It was a place of worship and prayer. At the Temple there was a special place for Gentiles to come and worship God too. Gentiles are people who are not Israelites; they are people from other nations. It has always been God's plan that the Israelites would bless the people from other nations by telling them about the one true God and his love for everyone. But something had gone terribly wrong. The Israelites had forgotten God's plan and purpose for them. Let's listen to what Jesus had to do to make it right.

One day Jesus visited the Temple and saw that the Temple courtyard was filled with shopping stalls and animals and greedy money changers who were cheating the people of their money! There were many Gentiles and Jewish people there who wanted to pray and offer a sacrifice to God, but they were stopped by the moneychangers and sellers. How do you think Jesus felt? Yes, he was angry. God's house had become a marketplace instead of a house of prayer. He tipped over the moneychangers' tables and drove out the animals to make room for the true worshippers of God. After he had done this, the lame and blind people who were there came to Jesus to be healed. Even the children in the crowd came to Jesus and sang, "Hosanna to the Son of David!" But the Jewish leaders and the sellers were very angry that Jesus cleared away their greedy trade.

After Jesus cleared the Temple, he told the people that soon the Temple made of stone would not be God's place to live anymore. Instead Jesus would be the Temple and **his** blood would pay for the sins of all people. Jesus would have to suffer and die to do this. If we want to meet with God we must go, not to a building, but to Jesus.

Suggested Questions: How does Jesus help the people in this story? (He confronts sin, teaches about true worship, helps the Gentiles, heals)

- How does this story help us today? (we now know that Jesus is the true temple and we can pray anytime, anywhere)
- Why did Jesus come into the Temple court and tip over the tables and drive the money changers out? (he was angry)
- Why was Jesus angry? (because the moneychangers were sinning greatly by not honoring God's holy place. They were cheating people and not allowing others to worship God. God's house had become a place for greed and stopped people from praying)
- What did God really want the Temple to be like and who was it for? (holy, a house of prayer for Jews and all nations)
- What did Jesus mean when he said, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up."? (He meant his body. He would become the true temple)
